

# Alice In Wonderland Author Lewis Carroll

It was during his early years at Oxford that he began writing poetry and short stories under a pseudonym, eventually settling on the name **Lewis**

**Carroll**—a playful Latinized version of his own name (Ludovicus Carolus, becoming Lewis Carroll).

## THE BIRTH OF ALICE IN WONDERLAND

### The Famous Picnic on the River

The inspiration for what would become *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* came on a golden summer afternoon, July 4, 1862, during a rowing trip on the River Thames near Oxford. The **Alice in Wonderland author Lewis Carroll** was accompanied by his friend Henry Liddell, the Dean of Christ Church, and the Dean's three young daughters: Lorina, Alice, and Edith. To entertain the girls during the five-mile journey from Oxford to Godstow, Carroll began telling a spontaneous story about a bored little girl named Alice who falls down a rabbit hole into a bizarre world filled with talking animals, eccentric characters, and impossible logic. Ten-year-old Alice Liddell, the namesake for the story's heroine, was so captivated that she begged him to write it down. That evening, Carroll began crafting a handwritten manuscript, eventually presenting it to Alice as a Christmas gift in 1864 under the title *Alice's Adventures Under Ground*.

### From Manuscript to Published Masterpiece

Friends and fellow writers who saw the manuscript encouraged Carroll to publish it commercially. He expanded the story from 18,000 words to 35,000 words, adding famous episodes such as the Mad Hatter's Tea Party, the Cheshire Cat, and the Queen of Hearts' croquet ground. John Tenniel, a leading political cartoonist for *Punch* magazine, was commissioned to create the illustrations. *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* was published in 1865 under the Lewis Carroll pseudonym, and it became an instant success. The book's delightful nonsense, clever wordplay, and surreal humour were unlike anything published before, and it has never since been out of print. A sequel, *Through the Looking-Glass and What Alice Found There*, followed in 1871, further cementing the legacy of the **Alice in Wonderland author Lewis Carroll**.

### Mathematical Logic and Nonsense
