PRACTICE: LINEAR
EQUATIONS**

Let's start with the bedrock of the curriculum: solving linear equations. The most common challenge here is managing variables on both sides of the equals sign. The golden rule is always to isolate the variable by performing inverse operations.

Problem

1: Variables on Both Sides

Solve for x: $5x - 8 = 3x + 12$

**Step-by-Step
Solution:**

1. **Move the variables to one side.**
Subtract $3x$ from both sides to keep the coefficient positive: $5x - 3x - 8 = 3x - 3x + 12$. This simplifies to $2x - 8 = 12$.
2. **Isolate the variable term.**
Add 8 to both sides: $2x - 8 + 8$

$= 12 + 8$. This gives you $2x = 20$.

3. **Solve for x.**

Divide both sides by 2: $2x / 2 = 20 / 2$. Therefore, $x = 10$.

Check your work:

Substitute 10 back into the original equation:
 $5(10) - 8 = 3(10) + 12$
 $\rightarrow 50 - 8 = 30 + 12 \rightarrow$
 $42 = 42$. It checks out!

Problem 2: Equations with Parentheses

Solve for y: $4(y + 3) = 2y + 22$

Step-by-Step Solution:

1. **Distribute.**

Multiply the 4 by both terms inside the parentheses:
 $4y + 12 = 2y + 22$.

2. **Move variables.**

Subtract $2y$ from both sides: $4y - 2y + 12 = 2y - 2y + 22$. This simplifies to $2y + 12 = 22$.

3. **Isolate the variable.**

Subtract 12 from both sides: $2y + 12 - 12 = 22 - 12$. You get $2y = 10$.

4. **Solve.** Divide both sides by 2:
 $y = 5$.

Practicing these two types of equations is essential. Most **8th grade math practice problems** involving

algebra will build upon these fundamental techniques.

UNDERSTANDING AND APPLYING FUNCTIONS

The concept of a function can be tricky at first. A simple way to think about it is as a machine: you put an input (x) into the machine, and it produces exactly one output (y). In 8th grade, you will mostly work with linear functions, which graph as straight lines.

Identifying Slope and Y-

Intercept

Consider the function: $f(x) = -2x + 5$. In this standard form ($y = mx + b$), m represents the slope (rate of change) and b represents the y-intercept (where the line crosses the y-axis).

This means for every unit increase in x , y decreases by 2.
- **Y-Intercept (b):** 5. This means the line crosses the y-axis at the point $(0, 5)$.

Context

Scenario: A taxi company charges a flat fee of \$3.50 plus \$2.00 per mile. Write a function $C(m)$ to represent the total cost for a ride of m miles.

Solution: The flat fee is the y -intercept (initial value), and the per-mile charge is the slope (rate of change). Therefore, the function is $C(m) = 2m + 3.50$.

Follow-up question: How much would a 7-mile ride cost?

Solution: Plug $m = 7$ into the function: $C(7) = 2(7) + 3.50 = 14 + 3.50 = \17.50 .

This type of real-world application is a staple in **8th grade math practice problems**. It tests whether a student can translate a word problem into an algebraic model.

GEOMETRY: THE PYTHAGOREAN THEOREM IN ACTION

The Pythagorean Theorem is a highlight of 8th grade geometry. The theorem states that in a right triangle, the square of the hypotenuse (the side opposite the right angle) is equal to the sum of the squares of the other two sides (legs). The formula is $a^2 + b^2 = c^2$, where c is the hypotenuse.

4: Finding the Hypotenuse

A ladder is leaning against a wall. The base of the ladder is 5 feet from the wall, and the ladder reaches 12 feet up the wall. How long is the ladder?

Visualize and Solve:

- The distance from the wall to the base is one leg ($a = 5$).
- The height the ladder reaches is the other leg ($b = 12$).
- The length of the ladder is the hypotenuse (c).

Step 1: Apply the formula: $5^2 + 12^2 = c^2$.

Step 2: Calculate the squares: $25 + 144 = c^2$.

Step 3: Add: $169 = c^2$.

Step 4: Find the square root: $c = \sqrt{169}$. Therefore, $c = 13$ feet.

Answer: The ladder is 13 feet long. This is a classic example of a 5-12-13 right triangle, a common Pythagorean triple you will encounter in many **8th grade math practice problems.**

Problem

5: Finding a Missing Leg

The hypotenuse of a right triangle is 17 inches, and one leg is 8

inches. Find the length of the other leg.

Solution:

- We know $c = 17$ and $a = 8$. We need to find b .
- Formula: $a^2 + b^2 = c^2 \rightarrow 8^2 + b^2 = 17^2$.
- Calculate: $64 + b^2 = 289$.
- Isolate b^2 : $b^2 = 289 - 64 = 225$.
- Find the square root: $b = \sqrt{225} = 15$ inches.

UNDERSTANDING SYSTEMS OF EQUATIONS

A system of equations is a set of two or more equations with the same variables. The solution is the point (x, y) that satisfies both equations. In 8th grade, you learn to solve these graphically (where the lines intersect) and

algebraically.

Problem 6: Solving a System by Substitution

Solve the following system:

$$y = 2x + 1$$

$$3x + 2y = 16$$

Step-by-Step Solution:

1. **Substitute.**

Since y is already isolated in the first equation, replace y in the second equation with $2x + 1$: $3x + 2(2x + 1) = 16$.

2. **Distribute and**

combine. $3x + 4x + 2 = 16 \rightarrow 7x + 2 = 16$.

3. **Solve for x.**

Subtract 2: $7x = 14$. Divide by 7: $x = 2$.

4. **Solve for y.**

Plug $x = 2$ back into the first equation: $y = 2(2) + 1 = 4 + 1 = 5$.

Answer: The solution is the point (2, 5). This means the two lines intersect at $x = 2$ and $y = 5$. Practicing these algebraic steps is vital for success with **8th grade math practice problems**.

STATISTICS: SCATTER PLOTS AND LINES OF BEST FIT

Eighth-grade statistics focuses on understanding relationships between
