$$P = a + b + c$$

5. **Estimate First:** Before calculating, make a rough estimate. If a triangle has a base of 5 and a height of 10, the area should be around 25. If

your calculator gives 250, you know you made a mistake.

COMMON MISTAKES AND HOW TO AVOID THEM

Even experienced students can slip up on simple problems. A good **Perimeter and Area of a Triangle Worksheet** will often include distractors specifically designed to catch common errors. Being aware of these pitfalls will help you avoid them.

- **Confusing Perimeter and Area:** This is the most common mistake. Students add the sides when they should multiply the base and height, or vice

- **Unit Errors:** Mixing units (e.g., using a base measured in meters with a height measured in centimeters) will lead to incorrect answers. Always convert all measurements to the same unit before calculating.
