2. THE GRID METHOD (ESTIMATION AND APPROXIMATION)

What to Look for in a High-Quality Worksheet

Sample Problem Breakdown: Decomposition in Action

Let us walk through a typical problem you might find on an **area of irregular figures worksheet**.

The Problem: A shape looks like an L. The total height of the shape is 12 cm. The total width is 10 cm. The left vertical segment is 8 cm high. The bottom horizontal segment is 6 cm wide. Find the total area.

Step 1: Decompose. Step 2: Find Missing Lengths. This is the critical thinking step. - In Method A: The top rectangle's height is 12 cm (total) - 8 cm (bottom) = 4 cm. - In Method B: The right rectangle's height is 12 cm - 8 cm (height of left rectangle) = 4 cm. Its width is 10 cm (total) - 6 cm (width of left rectangle) = 4 cm. It becomes a

square!

Step 3: Calculate and Add (using Method A). - Area of top rectangle = 6 cm * 4 cm = 24 cm². - Area of bottom rectangle = 10 cm * 8 cm = 80 cm². - Total Area = 24 cm² + 80 cm² = **104 cm²**.

This process of deduction and calculation is precisely what a well-designed worksheet will reinforce.

Common Pitfalls to Watch For
