From Japan, they cross the Pacific to San Francisco, where they encounter a political rally, a train robbery, and a spectacular encounter with a herd of buffalo. Their progress is nearly thwarted by a storm on the Atlantic, but Fogg buys a steamer and burns part of the ship’s superstructure to keep the boilers going.

## The Twist of Time

When Fogg finally returns to London, he believes he has lost his bet—he arrives at the Reform Club five minutes late. Despondent, he prepares to forfeit his fortune.
