- **Safety glasses:** Always protect your eyes from falling debris and twigs.
- **Disinfectant:** Rubbing alcohol or a bleach solution to clean your blades between cuts, especially if you are pruning multiple trees or removing diseased wood.

Step 3: Thin Out Crowded Branches

This is where the art of pruning really comes into play. Look inside the canopy for branches that are crossing, rubbing against each other, or growing inward toward the centre of the tree. Crossing branches can create wounds where disease enters. Branches growing inward block light and air from reaching the centre of the tree. Choose the weaker or less desirable branch and remove it at its point of origin. Your goal is to create an open, vase-like shape that allows sunlight to reach the interior and air to circulate freely. Good air circulation is essential for preventing fungal diseases. Step 4: Lower the Height (If Needed)
