Occidental College, Columbia University, and Harvard Law

Illinois State Senate (1997–2004)

The Clean Power Plan and the Paris Climate Agreement were landmark environmental policies, though the latter was later rejoined by President Biden after the Trump administration withdrew.

Foreign Policy: Killing of Bin Laden and the Iran Deal

Obama's foreign policy was characterized by a combination of diplomacy and targeted military action. One of the defining moments came on May 2, 2011, when U.S. Navy SEALs killed Osama bin Laden in Abbottabad, Pakistan—a mission Obama authorized. He also ended the war in Iraq (withdrawal completed in 2011) and surged troops in Afghanistan, eventually transitioning to a support role.

In 2015, Obama negotiated the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) with Iran, limiting Iran's nuclear program in exchange for sanctions relief—a controversial but significant diplomatic achievement. He also normalized diplomatic relations with Cuba and led a global coalition against ISIS. After leaving office in January 2017, Obama remained active through the Obama Foundation, which focuses on civic engagement, leadership development, and a planned Obama Presidential Center in Chicago. He and Michelle Obama have also produced documentaries and embarked on a national book tour for his memoir *A Promised Land* (2020). His post-presidential approval ratings have remained high, and he has periodically weighed in on pressing issues such as voting rights, racial injustice, and climate change.

Obama's influence endures in the Democratic Party, where many of his former staffers have moved into key roles. He has also navigated the delicate role of a former president offering criticism while refraining from direct attacks on his successor.
