

When Was Wuthering Heights First Published

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INTRODUCTION: A TIMELESS MASTERPIECE AND ITS DEBUT

Few novels have captured the imagination of readers as profoundly as Emily Brontë’s *Wuthering Heights*. The Brontë sisters—Charlotte, Emily, and Anne—had been writing poetry and prose for years. After a joint volume of poetry failed commercially, they each turned to novels. Emily’s *Wuthering Heights* was accepted by Thomas Newby, a London publisher known for sometimes lax production standards. Newby agreed to publish the novel under the pseudonym Ellis Bell. The publication of *Wuthering Heights* in December 1847 was, in many ways, a gamble. It followed the success of Charlotte Brontë’s *Jane Eyre*, which had been published in October 1847 under the name Currer Bell. The close timing of these releases—*Jane Eyre* a few months earlier—meant that *Wuthering Heights* entered a literary market already buzzing with the Bell family mystery. Many readers wondered who these Bells were, adding an air of intrigue to the question **when was Wuthering Heights first published** as part of this larger family literary emergence.

THE JOURNEY TO PUBLICATION: EMILY BRONTË’S PATH TO PRINT

Before we can appreciate the publication date, it is worth tracing how *Wuthering Heights* came to be printed. Emily Brontë, born in 1818, lived a quiet life in the parsonage of Haworth, Yorkshire. She and her siblings created elaborate imaginary worlds, and Emily’s writing was deeply personal and fiercely original. The manuscript of *Wuthering Heights* was completed sometime in 1846 or early 1847. Charlotte Brontë, acting as a sort of literary agent for the family, had submitted their works to various publishers. Newby finally accepted Emily’s novel along with Anne’s *Agnes Grey*. The contract was signed, and the printing began. But Newby was notoriously slow and disorganized, which may have contributed to the exact December publication. Some scholars argue that the novel was actually printed in November but not officially released until December, allowing the title page to carry the year 1847. Regardless, the answer to **when was Wuthering Heights first published** remains historically anchored to that late autumn/winter moment.

The Role of the Pseudonym “Ellis Bell”

One of the most intriguing aspects surrounding the first publication is the use of the pseudonym Ellis Bell. Emily Brontë, like her sisters, adopted a gender-neutral pen name to avoid the prejudice against female authors prevalent in Victorian society. “Ellis” suggested a male author, and this choice had consequences for how the novel was received. INITIAL RECEPTION: HOW THE FIRST EDITION WAS RECEIVED

When *Wuthering Heights* first appeared in December 1847, it did not receive universal acclaim. In fact, the early reviews were mixed to negative. Many critics were shocked by the novel’s raw depiction of cruelty, its morally ambiguous characters, and its lack of conventional sentiment. The *Atlas* review in January 1848 called it “a strange, inartistic story,” while *Britannia* found it “disagreeable.” Yet there were also defenders. The first edition of *Wuthering Heights* is a highly sought-after collector’s item. Published in three volumes (with *Agnes Grey* occupying the third volume), the first edition is now extremely rare. The original bindings were cloth, usually in a drab brown or green, with paper labels on the spines. The text contains numerous typographical errors, largely due to Newby’s careless printing. For example, the name “Lockwood” appears as “Lockwood” throughout but sometimes misspelled. These imperfections are part of the book’s charm. Today, a first edition can fetch tens of thousands of dollars at auction. When collectors ask **when was Wuthering Heights first published**, they are also inquiring about the physical artifact—the exact date helps them verify authenticity. The publication year 1847, along with the publisher’s imprint, is a key identifier.

How the Date Was Confirmed

Scholars have used a combination of publisher ledgers, contemporary advertisements, and library records to pinpoint the release. An advertisement in the *Atlas* on December 18, 1847, announced that *Wuthering Heights* would be published “on the 21st instant.” This is the strongest evidence that December 21, 1847, is the specific date. Some library stamps from December 1847 also confirm that copies were available by the end of the month. Therefore, when someone asks **when was Wuthering Heights first published**, the precise answer is December 21, 1847—though in publishing history, the year alone often suffices.

AFTER PUBLICATION: EMILY BRONTË’S DEATH AND THE NOVEL’S RISE

Tragically, Emily Brontë did not live to see her novel become a classic. She died of tuberculosis on December 19, 1848, just one year and one day after the first publication (if we assume the December 21 date). She was only 30 years old. Her death meant that she never witnessed the gradual reevaluation of *Wuthering Heights* as a masterpiece. In the years after her death, the novel was out of print for a time. It was not until a second edition, published in 1850 under Charlotte Brontë’s editorial supervision, that the novel began to gain wider appreciation. Charlotte wrote a biographical notice and corrected some of the errors, explaining the genesis of the work. This edition introduced the novel to a new generation.
