- **G Major:** Place your middle finger on the 6th string, 3rd fret. Ring finger on the 5th string, 3rd fret. Pinky on the 1st string, 3rd fret.
- **C Major:** Ring finger on the 5th string, 3rd fret. Middle finger on

the 4th string, 2nd fret. Index finger on the 2nd string, 1st fret.

- **D Major:** Index finger on the 3rd string, 2nd fret. Ring finger on the 2nd string, 3rd fret. Middle finger on the 1st string, 2nd fret.
- **E minor:** Middle finger on the 5th string, 2nd fret. Ring finger on the 4th string, 2nd fret.
- **A minor:** Index finger on the 2nd string, 1st fret. Middle finger on the 4th string, 2nd fret. Ring finger on the 3rd string, 2nd fret.

Practicing these shapes individually before attempting the full progression will make the transition to playing the song much

smoother.

CHORD PROGRESSION BREAKDOWN

The **You Are God Alone** chords follow a logical and predictable pattern throughout most of the song. The verse and chorus use similar progressions, making the song easy to learn and memorize. Below is the standard progression as played in the key of G.

Verse Progressi on

The verse typically follows this pattern:

**G - C - G - D - Em - C
- G - D**

This progression cycles through the I, IV, V,

and vi chords. The movement from G to C feels like a lift, while the D chord creates anticipation. The Em chord adds a moment of reflection before returning to the stability of G. When you play these **You Are God Alone chords** in sequence, you will notice how naturally they support the melody and lyrics.

Chorus Progression

The chorus follows a very similar structure, often with slight variations for emphasis:

G - C - G - D - Em - C - G - D - G

The final G chord resolves the phrase,

STRUMMING PATTERNS AND RHYTHM

Knowing the chords is only half the battle. To truly bring the song to life, you need to develop a strumming pattern that fits the mood. The **You Are God Alone chords** lend themselves well to both slow, reverent strumming and more energetic rhythms, depending on the arrangement.

Slow Worship Strum

For a traditional, contemplative feel, use a slow down-up pattern with emphasis on the downbeat. A common pattern is:

Down, Down-Up, Up-Down-Up

- Repeat the pattern for each chord change.

For Beginner S

- **Practice chord transitions slowly.** Focus on moving between G, C, D, and Em without breaking rhythm. Use a metronome to keep steady time.
- **Start with a simple down-strum.** Do not worry about complex patterns at first. A steady down-up motion will suffice.
- **Sing along while you play.** This helps internalize the chord changes

and makes the worship experience more personal.

- **Use a capo if needed.** If the key of G feels too high or too low for your voice, experiment with capo placement.

For Intermedi ate Players

- **Add chord embellishment s.** Try adding a sus2 or sus4 to the G chord for a more modern sound. For example, play Gsus4 (3rd fret on the 1st string,

open 2nd and 3rd strings) before resolving to G.

- **Incorporate walk-downs.** Between chord changes, use single-note runs on the bass strings to add movement. For instance, when moving from G to C, play an F# on the 6th string, 2nd fret, as a passing tone.

- **Experiment with dynamics.** Start the verse softly and gradually increase volume and intensity as the song progresses. Use palm muting for a more controlled sound.
- **Use a looper pedal.** Record the chord progression and practice improvising melodies or
