It is not just the digestive systems of fish that create biogenic sand. Physical wave action constantly breaks apart living and dead coral structures. Storm waves can snap large branches of coral, which are then tumbled and abraded into smaller and smaller pieces over time. This creates a sand that is rich in calcium carbonate derived directly from the reef structure itself. Similarly, the shells of mollusks are constantly being eroded. # Black Sand: The Volcanic Connection
