BEST TIME TO VISIT HAWAII: A SEASONAL GUIDE

Be prepared for higher prices and book popular activities such as helicopter tours or luaus well ahead of time.

GETTING AROUND THE ISLANDS: TRANSPORTATION TIPS

Rideshare services like Uber and Lyft are available on all major islands but can become expensive for longer distances. For shorter trips within resort areas or urban centers, rideshares are a convenient option when you prefer not to drive.
