

# List Of Passengers On The Titanic

Upon departure, the ship carried roughly 1,317 passengers — though this number has been debated due to late cancellations and last-minute bookings. Today, researchers use original White Star Line records, newspaper reports of the era, and passenger testimonials to reconstruct accurate manifests.

### FIRST CLASS: THE GILDED ELITE

The first-class passenger list reads like a who's who of the Gilded Age. These were individuals who paid between £30 and £870 for a ticket (the equivalent of thousands of dollars today). Their accommodations featured private promenades, a Turkish bath, a squash court, and grand dining saloons.

## Notable First-Class Passengers

- **John Jacob Astor IV** — One of the wealthiest men in America, Astor was traveling with his young pregnant wife, Madeleine. He famously asked to join his wife in a lifeboat but was refused. His body was recovered later.

- **Benjamin Guggenheim** — The mining magnate who, along with his valet, famously dressed in evening wear and declared, "We are dressed in our best and are prepared to go down like gentlemen."
- **Margaret "Molly" Brown** — Known as the "Unsinkable Molly Brown," she helped commandeer Lifeboat No. 6 and later advocated for survivors' rights.
- **Isidor and Ida Straus** — Co-owner of Macy's department store. Ida refused to leave her husband's side, saying, "Where you go, I go." Both perished.
- **Sir Cosmo and Lady Duff-Gordon** — Scottish aristocrats who survived, but faced controversy over the number of seats in their lifeboat.

Out of 329 first-class passengers, about 199 survived — a survival rate of roughly 60%, the highest of any class due to priority access to lifeboats and proximity to the boat deck.

### SECOND CLASS: THE MIDDLE-CLASS DREAMERS

The second-class manifest included professionals, academics, clergymen, merchants, and skilled artisans. These travelers enjoyed comfortable accommodations with private bathrooms, a library, and a dedicated dining room. The **list of passengers on the Titanic** in second class reflects a more modest ambition — many were traveling for business, education, or to reunite with family in North America.

## Notable Second-Class Passengers

- **Michel and Edmond Navratil** — Father Michel Navratil, using the alias "Louis M. Hoffman," kidnapped his two sons and boarded the Titanic. He perished, but the "Titanic Orphans" were reunited with their mother weeks later.
- **Lawrence Beesley** — A British science teacher who survived in Lifeboat No. 13 and later wrote one of the most important firsthand accounts of the sinking, *The Loss of the SS Titanic*.
- **Father Thomas Byles** — A Catholic priest who heard confessions and led prayers during the final moments. He refused a seat in a lifeboat and died helping others.

Of 277 second-class passengers, only about 119 survived — a survival rate of roughly 43%. Many second-class cabins were located directly below the boat deck, but access to lifeboats was delayed as crew prioritized first class.

### THIRD CLASS: THE IMMIGRANT HEART OF THE SHIP

The largest group — and the one with the most tragic survival statistics — were the third-class passengers. The **list of passengers on the Titanic** in steerage is a multicultural record: Irish, English, Swedish, Finnish, Italian, Chinese, Syrian, Lebanese, and many others. They were primarily immigrants hoping to start new lives in the United States or Canada. Most traveled in cramped, communal quarters in the lower decks, far from the lifeboats.

# Obstacles to Survival

- Physical barricades and locked gates (though disputed by some historians) slowed third-class passengers from reaching the upper decks.
- Language barriers made emergency announcements incomprehensible.
- Lifeboat drills were not conducted for steerage passengers.
- Many were simply unaware of the severity of the collision until it was too late.

Out of approximately 710 third-class passengers, only about 174 survived — a survival rate of just 24%. Whole families were lost, such as the Skoog family of Sweden (six members, none survived) or the Goodwin family of England (eight members, none survived).

## Notable Third-Class Survivors

- **Millvina Dean** — At just two months old, she was the youngest passenger aboard. She survived with her mother and brother, but her father perished. Millvina became the last living Titanic survivor when she died in 2009.
- **Michel Navratil Jr.** — One of the "Titanic Orphans," he later learned his true identity and lived to be 92, passing away in 2001.
- **Anna Sofia Turja** — A Finnish immigrant who survived and later raised a family in the U.S., representing the resilience of steerage survivors.

### THE CREW: UNSUNG HEROES AND VICTIMS

The official passenger list often excludes crew, but the White Star Line manifest did include 885 crew members who were aboard the Titanic. The crew list includes officers, seamen, engineers, firemen, stewards, cooks, entertainers, and even a barber. Their survival rate was the lowest of all — only about 212 crew members survived, a rate of roughly 24%.

## Notable Crew

- **Captain Edward Smith** — The captain who went down with his ship. His final words have been debated, but he was last seen near the bridge.
- **Thomas Andrews** — The ship's architect who diligently calculated that the Titanic would sink in under two hours. He was last seen in the smoking room, throwing deck chairs into the water for passengers.
- **Harold Bride** — Junior wireless operator who remained at his post sending distress signals until the power failed. He was rescued, but badly frostbitten.
- **Jack Phillips** — Senior wireless operator whose "CQD" and "SOS" messages summoned the *Carpathia*. Phillips

perished.

- **Violet Jessop** — A stewardess who survived the sinking and later served as a nurse on the *Britannic* (which also sank). She became known as "Miss Unsinkable."
- **Charles Lightoller** — Second officer who supervised the loading of lifeboats and later gave crucial testimony. He was famously sucked under the ship but survived.

### USED TODAY

More than a century after the disaster, the **list of passengers on the Titanic** remains an invaluable resource for genealogists, historians, and families seeking to trace their ancestry. Websites like the Encyclopedia Titanica, Ellis Island records, and the National Archives of the UK offer searchable databases. Many descendants have discovered their connection through the manifest, often leading to emotional reunions with distant relatives.

Additionally, the passenger list has been memorialized permanently in the **Titanic Memorial** in New York City's Battery Park, and in other memorials in Southampton, Belfast, and Washington, D.C. Each name represents a person with a story — a dream, a fear, a love left behind.

## Controversies and Discrepancies

Despite its thoroughness, the official manifest is not perfectly accurate. Some passengers boarded without tickets or used aliases. Others canceled at the last minute (like writer Henry Adams or shipping magnate J.P. Morgan), and some were not recorded due to clerical errors. The exact number of passengers and crew is still debated: the British Board of Trade report listed 2,201, while the U.S. inquiry noted 2,223. These small discrepancies remind us that the human record is never perfect — only the memory endures.

The **list of passengers on the Titanic** is far more than a roster of the dead and the saved. It is a testament to the dreams of millions who emigrated across the Atlantic, a mirror of class divides that defined an era, and a painful reminder of hubris and heroism.
