Technical Staging:

Lighting, Angles, and Composition

These images were also reproduced as posters for recruitment drives and war bond campaigns. The reach of these photographs was immense. *Signal* alone had a circulation of over two million copies and was distributed in dozens of languages across occupied Europe and neutral countries.
