## Full-Fat Dairy

## Fried Foods and Baked Goods

French fries, fried chicken, doughnuts, pastries, cookies, and cakes are typically made with unhealthy oils and contain trans

fats. These foods are calorie-dense and offer little nutritional value. Instead, satisfy cravings with baked, grilled, or steamed alternatives. For example, enjoy air-popped popcorn instead of chips, or homemade whole-grain muffins using applesauce instead of butter.

## Tropical Oils and Butter

Coconut oil and palm oil are high in saturated fat despite being plant-based. While some claim health benefits, for a **low fat and cholesterol diet**, it's wise to use them sparingly. Replace butter with spreads made from unsaturated oils, or simply use fruit purees or broth for cooking.

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## How to Read Nutrition Labels
