Right-click this new, shorter version and select "Show in Finder" (Mac) or "Show in Windows Explorer" (PC). You will see a file ending in **.m4a**. Right-click this file, select "Rename," and change the extension from **.m4a** to **.m4r**. A confirmation dialog may appear—click "Use .m4r" to confirm. This file is now a ringtone format.

Step 3: Sync the Ringtone to Your iPhone

Connect your iPhone to your computer using a USB cable. In iTunes (or Finder on macOS Catalina+), select your device. Click on the "Tones" tab (or "Music" tab, then check "Sync Tones"). Drag the new .m4r file into the Tones window, or simply sync your device normally. Once the sync completes, unplug your iPhone and go to Settings > Sounds & Haptics > Ringtone. Your new custom ringtone should appear at the top of the list. Select it, and you are done. This method is reliable and uses only official Apple tools, making it a safe and effective way to learn **how to make a song a ringtone** on an iPhone.

Using GarageBand on iPhone (No Computer Needed)

If you do not have access to a computer, GarageBand for iOS offers a clever workaround. First, download the song to your Files app. Open GarageBand, create a new track, and swipe through the instruments until you find "Audio Recorder." Tap the waveform icon at the top left to enter the timeline view. Tap the loop icon (top right), then tap "Browse Items from My Files." Method 1: Using a File Manager

1. Download and install a ringtone maker app.
