- **Progressive Overload:** Since you cannot simply add plates to a barbell, you must increase difficulty by altering leverage, range of motion, or time under tension. The systematic approach provides dozens of progressions for each movement pattern (push, pull, legs, core).
- **Periodization:** Rather than training at maximum intensity every day, the system cycles through phases of accumulation

(building volume), intensification (building strength), and deloading (recovery). This prevents overtraining and consolidates gains.

- **Individualization:** No two bodies are the same. The system teaches you how to assess your current strength level and choose the correct starting point. It emphasizes working within your current capacity to build a foundation before pursuing advanced skills like the front lever or handstand push-up.
- **Structural Balance:** A common pitfall in bodyweight training is neglecting pulling movements in favor of pushing ones, leading to muscle imbalances and shoulder

issues. The systematic approach mandates equal volume and intensity for horizontal and vertical pushing and pulling, along with dedicated core and leg work.

---

### NAVIGATING THE PROGRESSIONS: FROM BEGINNER TO ADVANCED

---

The beauty of a systematic approach is the clear roadmap. Instead of attempting a full planche on day one, you follow a ladder. Let us examine how this works for a fundamental strength element: the push-up and its advanced relative, the planche.

## The Push-Up Progression Ladder

1. **Wall Push-Ups** (Phase 1: Foundation and tendon conditioning)
2. **Incline Push-Ups** (Lowering the angle of the body)
3. **Full Push-Ups** (Establishing midline stability and strength)
4. **Decline Push-Ups or Pseudo-Planche Push-Ups** (Shifting weight forward to increase demand on shoulders)
5. **Planche Holds (Tuck)** (Static)

position with knees tucked to the chest)

6. **Advanced Tuck Planche** (Straightening the back and pulling the knees closer)
7. **Straddle Planche** (Legs apart for better leverage, building towards full)
8. **Full Planche** (Legs straight and parallel to the ground)

Each step in this chain requires mastery of the previous one. The systematic approach also prescribes specific rep ranges and sets. For beginners, high volume (3-5 sets of 8-12 reps) builds muscular endurance and connective tissue strength. As you progress toward statics, holds of 10-30 seconds become the target. **Overcoming Gravity: a**

**systematic approach to gymnastics and bodyweight strength** emphasizes that rushing progressions is the fastest way to injury.

## PERIODIZATION: THE ENGINE OF LONG-TERM PROGRESS

## Accumulation Phase

After building the base, you enter a 4-6 week phase where you reduce volume but increase difficulty and load. This is where you attempt harder progressions. Instead of 50 pull-ups, you might perform 25 reps of weighted pull-ups or 15 reps of one-arm pull-up negatives. This phase pushes your nervous system and raw strength to new levels.

# The Deload and Test Phase

A critical part of any systematic approach is a rest week after each cycle. You reduce training volume by 40-60%. This allows your joints and central nervous system to supercompensate. At the end of the deload, you test your one-rep max or hold time on an advanced progression. Often, you will find that after a week of rest, you have suddenly broken through a plateau. This cyclical pattern is what makes **Overcoming Gravity: a systematic approach to gymnastics and bodyweight strength** so effective for sustained gains.

## INJURY PREVENTION: A CORNERSTONE OF THE SYSTEM

requires enough protein to repair muscle (approximately 1.6-2.2 g per kg of body weight), sufficient carbohydrates for energy during high-volume accumulation phases, and healthy fats for hormone function. The system encourages tracking macronutrients for a few weeks to understand baseline needs. Additionally, sleep is non-negotiable. Aim for 7-9 hours per night to allow the central nervous system to recover from the demands of gymnastic strength training. Without sleep, progressions stall and injury risk skyrockets.
