More advanced questions might involve number analogies or solving problems using basic arithmetic in creative ways. Nonverbal and Spatial Reasoning Skills

SAMPLE QUESTIONS BY GATE TEST TYPE

Since different districts in California use different assessments, it is helpful to review sample questions from the most commonly administered tests. CogAT Sample Questions for Third Grade

The Cognitive Abilities Test is one of the most widely used assessments for GATE identification in California. It contains three batteries: Verbal, Quantitative, and Nonverbal. Each battery measures distinct cognitive processes.

Verbal Battery Example: The first pair of words has a relationship. Choose the word that completes the second pair so that it has the same relationship. "Dog : Bark :: Cat : ____" A) Meow B) Run C) Sleep D) Eat. The correct answer is

meow because it is the sound a cat makes, just as bark is the sound a dog makes.

Quantitative Battery Example: Look at the number pattern and choose the number that comes next. "5, 10, 15, 20, ____" A) 21 B) 22 C) 25 D) 30. The correct answer is 25 because the pattern adds 5 each time.

Nonverbal Battery Example: Look at the figures in the top row. They change in a certain way. Choose the figure from the bottom row that should come next. This type of question requires the child to identify the pattern of shape transformations and select the correct continuation.

NNAT Sample Questions for Third Grade

The Naglieri Nonverbal Ability Test is entirely nonverbal, making it an excellent measure of general intelligence without language bias. The test uses progressive matrices where the child must identify the missing piece in a pattern.

NNAT Example: A 3x3 grid is shown with eight shapes and one empty box. The shapes follow a pattern across rows and down columns. The child must choose from six options the shape that

correctly completes the pattern. These questions require careful observation of how shapes change in size, rotation, shading, and position across the grid.

Practicing with Gate Testing Sample Questions 3rd Grade California for the NNAT is particularly helpful because the format is unique and may be unfamiliar to many children. Familiarity with the matrix format reduces test anxiety and allows the child to focus on the reasoning task rather than figuring out what the question is asking.

OLSAT Sample

Questions for Third Grade

The Otis-Lennon School Ability Test measures verbal and nonverbal reasoning abilities. It includes a variety of question types that assess different cognitive skills.

Verbal OLSAT Example: "Which one of these is most like a chair?" A) Table B) Bed C) Sofa D) Lamp. The child must understand that a sofa is most like a chair because both are used for sitting. This type of question assesses classification and categorization skills.

Nonverbal OLSAT Example: A series of figures is shown with one figure

missing. The child must choose the figure that completes the series from among several options. These questions often involve rotation, addition or subtraction of elements, and pattern recognition.

HOW TO PREPARE YOUR CHILD FOR GATE TESTING

Preparation for GATE testing should be gentle and supportive, focusing on reducing anxiety and building familiarity rather than intensive drilling. The goal is to help your child perform at their best by ensuring they understand the question formats and feel comfortable with the testing environment.

Creating a Positive Testing Mindset

Children often pick up on their parents' attitudes about testing. If you approach the GATE assessment as an exciting opportunity to show what they know, your child is more likely to feel confident and motivated. Avoid putting pressure on them or emphasizing the importance of qualifying for the program. Instead, frame the test as a fun puzzle challenge that helps the school understand how they learn best.

Using Sample Questions Effectively

Some children may feel nervous, which is completely normal. Reassure them that they do not need to

know every answer and that trying their best is what counts.

INTERPRETING GATE TEST RESULTS

After your child completes the GATE assessment, you will receive a score report that typically includes percentile rankings comparing your child's performance to other students in the same grade nationwide. A percentile rank of 95 or above is generally considered gifted, though many districts set their own thresholds. The report may also break down scores by verbal, quantitative, and nonverbal domains, providing insight into your child's relative strengths and areas for growth.

If your child qualifies for the GATE program, the school will provide

information about the specific services and enrichment opportunities available. If your child does not qualify, remember that GATE testing captures only one measure of ability at one point in time. Many schools offer opportunities for later testing or alternative identification methods. The most important thing is to continue supporting your child's intellectual curiosity and love of learning regardless of the test outcome.
