## Nonverbal Reasoning: Pattern Completion

**Sample Question:** The child is shown a 2x2 grid with three shapes filled in and one empty box. The shapes are: top left is a circle, top right is a square, bottom left is a triangle. The bottom right is empty. Answer choices include various shapes.

**Correct Answer:** A pentagon or a shape that does not repeat any of the existing three shapes.

**Explanation:** This tests the child's ability to recognize a pattern or rule. In this case, the rule is that each shape appears only once. The child must deduce that the missing shape must be different from the three already present, requiring attention to detail and logical deduction.

## Analogies

**Sample Question:** The child sees " $2 \rightarrow 4$ " and " $3 \rightarrow 6$ " and then " $4 \rightarrow ?$ " with answer choices: 5, 6, 7, 8.

**Correct Answer:** 8.

**Explanation:** This question measures the ability to identify a mathematical relationship. The pattern is "multiply by 2." The child must see the transformation rule in the first example and apply it to the new number. This is a foundational skill for algebraic thinking.
