- **First Retirement & Return (1994-95):** 26.9 PPG. After returning from a stint in baseball, Jordan played 17 games at the end of the season. This is the only other season where he averaged under 30 points.
- **Second Three-Peat Era (1995-96 to 1997-98):** 30.4, 29.6, and 28.7 PPG. Note that even in his "older" seasons (age 34), he still averaged 28.7 points per game while winning his sixth title.
- **Washington Wizards Return (2001-02 & 2002-03):** 22.9 and 20.0 PPG. These seasons, while remarkable for a 40-year-old player, did lower his overall career average slightly. Yet, they also prove that even at the very end of his career, he was still a starting-caliber scorer in the NBA.

When you look at this sequence, the pattern is clear: for ten full seasons (excluding his rookie injury, the abbreviated return, and his Wizards years), Michael Jordan scored at a rate that was almost always above 30 points

Kobe Bryant (25.0 PPG)

Kobe is often considered the closest heir to Jordan's scoring legacy. However, his career average is lower because of his early bench role and his later seasons after his Achilles injury. Jordan's consistency from day one was superior.
