- **The Queen of Hearts** – Dali portrays the Queen as a towering, armored figure with a long spear-like scepter. Her heart-shaped face and red accents are menacing yet absurd, perfectly capturing the queen's tyrannical rage.

Throughout the series, Dali incorporates recurring motifs from his own visual vocabulary: crutches (supporting fragile reality), floating eyes (the omnipresent observer), and melting forms (the collapse of time). These are not random; they are Dali's way of interpreting Carroll's themes of perception, authority, and metamorphosis.

THE PUBLICATION HISTORY: THE 1969 RANDOM HOUSE EDITION

The **Alice In Wonderland Illustrated By Salvador Dali** edition was published in 1969 by Maecenas Press / Random House in a limited run of 2,700 copies. The book was signed and numbered by Dali himself. It was issued in a linen slipcase with a leather spine, and each of the twelve heliogravures was protected by a tissue guard. The edition was an immediate collector's item, though its price has skyrocketed over the decades. Today, a complete copy in fine condition can fetch tens of thousands of dollars at auction. The rarity and the fame of both artist and author have made this one of the most sought-after illustrated books of the modern era.

Beyond the signed limited edition, a trade edition was also released, but it omitted the hand-coloring and the signature. Some later reprints have attempted to recreate the experience, but the original 1969 edition remains the definitive version.

LEGACY AND INFLUENCE: HOW DALI'S ILLUSTRATIONS REFRAME ALICE

Dali's work on *Alice* did more than add surrealist flair; it fundamentally reframed how readers understand the story.
