## PERFECT RHYMES FOR HOP: WORDS THAT MATCH EXACTLY

- **bop** – A style of jazz or a light hit. Example: "He gave the ball a gentle bop."

- **crop** – A plant harvest, or to cut short. Example: "Farmers harvest the wheat crop."
- **drop** – To fall or let fall. Example: "Watch the leaf drop from the tree."
- **flop** – To fall heavily, or a failure. Example: "The movie was a total flop."
- **glop** – A sticky, thick substance. Example: "The glue formed a blob of glop."
- **knop** – A decorative knob or bud (less common but valid). Example: "The staff had a silver knop."
- **lop** – To cut off, especially branches. Example: "They had to lop the overgrown limbs."
- **mop** – A cleaning tool, or the action of cleaning. Example: "She used a mop to clean the floor."
- **plop** – The sound of something dropping into liquid. Example: "The stone fell with a soft plop."
- **pop** – A burst sound, or popular music/culture. Example: "The balloon went pop!"
- **prop** – A support, or a theatrical object. Example: "The

actor used a fake sword as a prop."

- **shop** – A store, or to go shopping. Example: "Let's shop for groceries today."
- **slop** – Spilled liquid or waste food. Example: "The pigs ate the kitchen slop."
- **strop** – A leather strap for sharpening razors, or a bad mood. Example: "He was in a real strop after the argument."
- **swap** – To exchange. Example: "Let's swap seats so you can see better."
- **top** – The highest point, or a spinning toy. Example: "Climb to the top of the hill."
- **whop** – To hit hard (also spelled wop). Example: "He gave the ball a mighty whop."

Notice that while **hop** itself has a short /ɒ/ sound (as in British pronunciation 'hot'), American English often uses a slightly different vowel in words like "top" and "pop". However, they are still considered perfect rhymes in practice, especially in most dialects. For the strictest match, test the vowel sound in your local accent. Nevertheless, the list above works for the vast majority of English speakers.

## Adding Consonant Blends: Words Like 'Shop' and 'Drop'

Many perfect rhymes for hop begin with consonant blends. Words like **shop**, **drop**, and **crop** are common in everyday language. These are extremely useful because they offer a variety of meanings. For instance, if you are writing about a market scene, you can pair "hop" with "shop" and "drop" to create a lively rhythm. Similarly, in a sports poem, "hop," "bop," and "top" can convey movement and action.

Here is an example of a short verse using perfect rhymes:

## NEAR RHYMES AND SLANT RHYMES FOR HOP

Other near rhymes can include words that end with a similar but not identical consonant, like **hot** (changes final /p/ to /t/), **hob** (changes to /b/), or **hock** (changes to /k/). While these are not true rhymes, they can create a pleasing echo in free verse or when used in internal rhyme.

For example, a line like "The water was **hot**, so he gave a **hop**" uses assonance (shared vowel) and a close consonant, adding a subtle rhyme that avoids being too sing-songy. Mastering near rhymes allows you to convey meaning without forcing an unnatural word choice.

MULTI-SYLLABLE WORDS THAT RHYME WITH HOP

Adding syllables increases the rhythmic complexity. For two-syllable words, the final syllable /ɒp/ must carry the stress for a perfect match. Here are common multi-syllable words that rhyme with hop, either perfectly or nearly.

Two-Syllable Perfect Rhymes (Stress on the last syllable)

- **develop** – The final syllable /əloʊp/ rhymes with hop if pronounced "de-VEL-op". However, many speakers say "de-VEL-əp" making the last vowel a schwa. In careful speech or song, it can be rhymed.
- **envelop** – Similar to develop, the final syllable can be forced to rhyme.

- **wallop** – To hit hard. "Wah-lop" rhymes perfectly.

These are especially useful because they contain the word "hop" itself! For example, "The horse began to **gallop**, with each graceful **hop**." This internal rhyme technique is both clever and satisfying.

Near Multi-Syllable Rhymes

Many longer words have a similar ending but not exact. For instance:

- **teardrop** – Contains "drop" (a perfect rhyme for hop), so effectively a compound word rhyme.
- **lollipop** – Ends in "pop", a perfect rhyme. "Lollipop" can be used as a fun, playful rhyme for hop in children's poetry.
- **overhop** – A verb meaning to hop over, rare but usable.
- **flip-flop** – A compound word where "flop" is a perfect rhyme. Great for repetitive sounds.

When using multi-syllable rhymes, pay attention to the stress pattern. For a convincing rhyme, the final stressed syllable must match the rhyme sound. In "gallop", the stress is on the first syllable, and the second syllable is unstressed, but the /ɒp/ is still clear. This makes it a true rhyme in most dictionaries.

USING WORDS THAT RHYME WITH HOP IN CREATIVE WRITING
