BREAKING DOWN THE CORE CHORDS

The core progression revolves around four primary chords: G, Cadd9, D, and Em. Some versions also incorporate Am7 for added texture, but the basic four will get you through the

G Major

The G major chord is the home base for this song. Cadd9

The third string remains open. This chord appears frequently in modern country music because of its rich, ringing quality.

D Major

The D major chord provides a bright lift in the progression. You can play it in the standard open position with your first

finger on the third string at the second fret, your second finger on the first string at the second fret, and your third finger on the second string at the third fret. The fourth string is left open. Make sure to strum only from the fourth string down, as including the fifth and sixth strings will muddy the sound.

E Minor

The E minor chord adds a touch of melancholy and depth to the progression. It is one of the easiest chords to play on the guitar. Simply place your second finger on the fifth string at the second fret and your third finger on the fourth string at the second fret. Strum all six strings open. This chord appears primarily in the verse and

helps create emotional contrast with the brighter G and Cadd9 chords.

THE FULL CHORD PROGRESSION

Now that you know the individual shapes, let's put them together. The typical progression for the verse of "Love Like Crazy" follows a pattern that repeats throughout the song. The structure is generally as follows:

- **Verse:** G, Cadd9, G, Cadd9, D, G, Em, Cadd9
- **Chorus:** Cadd9, G, D, Em, Cadd9, G, D
- **Bridge:** Cadd9, G, D, Em (repeated)

Experiment with dynamics, playing softer during the verse and louder during the chorus, to give the song shape and emotional arc.

One of the great things about the **Lee Brice Love Like Crazy chords** is that they leave room for interpretation. You can add hammer-ons, pull-offs, or simple

melodic embellishments to make the performance your own. For example, on the G chord, you can lift your third finger off the high E string briefly to create a quick pull-off to the open string. These small details make a big difference in how polished your playing sounds.
