### WELCOMING THE NEW SPOUSE

Direct a portion of your speech to the person your son has chosen. Praise their qualities genuinely—mention their

intelligence, warmth, patience, or how they bring out the best in your son. If you have a fond memory of meeting them for the first time or a shared experience, include it. This part of the speech shows that you accept them fully into your family. Use their first name and make eye contact with them as you speak.

### THE TOAST

## Choosing the Right Tone: Humorous, Emotional, or Both?

The best speeches for the father of the groom often blend humour and sincerity. Pure comedy can seem shallow, while non-stop sentimentality might become weepy. Aim for an 80% emotional core with 20% lightheartedness. If you naturally have a dry wit, use it sparingly.

For instance, after a touching story about your son’s kindness, you could add, “Though I haven’t forgiven him for the time he drove my car through the fence.” Keep humour inclusive, avoiding inside jokes that exclude the bride’s side or the general audience.
