WINTERIZATION AND STORAGE

If you live in a region with freezing temperatures and plan to store your Catalina hot tub for the season, the manual provides detailed winterization steps. Failure to follow them can result in cracked pipes and expensive repairs. The process generally includes:

1. Draining the water completely using the drain valve and a wet/dry vacuum to remove residual water from jets and lines.
2. Removing and storing filter cartridges inside the house.
3. Loosening or removing drain plugs from the pump and heater (locations are marked in the manual).
4. Wiping the shell dry and applying a protective cover.
5. Disconnecting power to prevent accidental startup.

For long-term storage, some owners also add a non-toxic antifreeze designed for spa plumbing—but only if the manufacturer recommends it. Always consult your **Catalina Hot Tub Manual** before using any additives.
