Negative Coefficients

Subtraction introduces a layer of complexity that often trips up new learners. The most common mistake is forgetting to distribute the negative sign. When you subtract one expression from another, you are essentially adding the opposite of the entire expression. This means every term inside the parentheses being subtracted changes sign.

Take the problem $(7x + 4) - (3x + 2)$. Many beginners want to simply subtract $3x$ from $7x$ and 2 from 4 , arriving at $4x + 2$. While this is correct for this specific example, it is a dangerous shortcut that fails when the signs inside the subtracted expression are not all

positive. The correct approach involves rewriting the problem as $7x + 4 - 3x - 2$. Now combining like terms gives $4x + 2$. The same answer, but the approach is more robust.

Subtracting Expressions with Multiple Terms

When an **adding and subtracting linear expressions worksheet** includes problems like $(5x - 3) - (-2x + 4)$, the distribution of the negative sign becomes critical. Rewriting gives $5x - 3 + 2x - 4$. Notice that the $-2x$ becomes $+2x$ because subtracting a

Problem: $(6x - 4) - (-2x + 7)$

Solution: Rewrite as $6x - 4 + 2x - 7$.
Combine x terms: $6x + 2x = 8x$.
Combine constants: $-4 - 7 = -11$. The
result is $8x - 11$.

Even diligent students make errors. A

Mistake 1: Forgetting to Distribute the Negative Sign
