Customer relationship management (CRM) software like Salesforce, data analytics platforms like Google Analytics, and collaboration tools like Slack or Asana are common. Even if you are not in a tech role, showing comfort with digital tools makes you more efficient and adaptable.

Adaptability and Flexibility

The modern workplace changes rapidly. Employers value candidates who can pivot when priorities shift, learn new skills quickly, and stay productive amid uncertainty. On your resume, mention instances where you adapted to new processes, took on unexpected responsibilities, or quickly mastered a new technology.

HOW TO LIST KEY SKILLS ON A RESUME

Even the best skills can be overlooked if they are not presented effectively. Here are strategies for making your skills stand out.

The Skills Section

Most resumes include a dedicated skills section near the top. This should be a concise, scannable list of your most relevant hard and soft skills. Use bullet points or a table if the format allows. Group similar skills together. For example, under "Technical Skills," list programming languages and tools. Under "Languages," list fluency levels. Keep it to 10-15 skills maximum to avoid clutter.
