- **Lateral surface area:** $LA = \pi r l$.
- **Slant height (Pythagorean):** $l = \sqrt{r^2 + h^2}$.

Pyramids

- **Volume of a square pyramid:** $V = (1/3) \times \text{area of base} \times \text{height}$.
- **Surface area:** $SA = \text{area of base} + \frac{1}{2} \times \text{perimeter of base} \times \text{slant height}$.

Additional Useful 3D Formulas

- **Volume of a hemisphere:** $V = (2/3)\pi r^3$.
- **Surface area of a hemisphere (without base):** $SA = 2\pi r^2$.
- **Volume of a frustum of a cone:** $V = (1/3)\pi h(R^2 + Rr + r^2)$, where R and r are radii of the two bases.

COORDINATE GEOMETRY FORMULAS

Circle Equation in Coordinate Plane

- **Standard equation:** $(x - h)^2 + (y - k)^2 = r^2$, where (h,k) is center, r is radius.

Area of a Polygon Given Coordinates

- **Shoelace formula:** $\text{Area} = \frac{1}{2} | (x_1y_2 + x_2y_3 + \dots + x_ny_1) - (y_1x_2 + y_2x_3 + \dots + y_nx_1) |$. This works for any simple polygon when vertices are ordered.

TRIGONOMETRY IN GEOMETRY

Area Using Trigonometry

- **Area of a triangle given two sides and included angle:** $A = \frac{1}{2} ab \sin C$.

Special Right Triangles

- **45-45-90 triangle:** Legs are equal; hypotenuse = leg $\times \sqrt{2}$.
- **30-60-90 triangle:** Short leg = x, long leg = $x\sqrt{3}$, hypotenuse = 2x.
