Third Movement the Pedal with Patience

Do not attempt the third movement at full speed. It is a whirlwind of notes. Break it down into small sections. Practice hands separately. Pay close attention to the fingering you choose, as poor fingering will cause you to stumble when you try to speed up. Work on your left-hand arpeggios, as they are the engine that drives the movement forward.

4. Understand

The pedal is a character in the Moonlight Sonata. In the first movement, a half-pedal or flutter pedal is often used to create the blurry, ethereal atmosphere without making the harmony muddy. In the third movement, the pedal is used more sparingly and often changed with each chord or arpeggio group to preserve clarity. Experiment with different pedaling techniques as you practice.
